Pyramid timber supply affected

# Canyon Creek fire threatens homes, timber sale lands

The Canyon Creek fire, burning now for over two months in the Scapegoat Wilderness, jumped containment perimeters Monday, forcing evacuation of homes and cabins and threatening a large timber sale area.

Marcia Hogan, fire information officer for the Lolo National Forest, said Tuesday night that the fire jumped across Lake Creek Monday and made a run to the south and sometime Monday night jumped the North Fork of the Blackfoot River and began moving east.

"Several thousand acres have burned on the south side of Lake Creek," she said, with some spotting near Ovando Mountain further south.

"The weather is causing us very serious concerns," she said, referring to gusty winds fanned by a Pacific cold front moving into the area.

'We've evacuated people from one cabin and two homes on the North Fork three miles south of the North Fork bridge, and we've evacuated people from 16 homes and cabins around Cooper Lakes. We're concerned at this point that it will move east to Cooper Lakes," she added.

The Cooper Lake area is about 15

miles northeast of Ovando in the Scapegoat Wilderness.

Today (Tuesday) we're trying to hold lines and crews are involved in structural protection, watering down homes and surrounding grounds," she said, adding that planes have been dropping retardants and helicopters have been flying water buckets.

The fire has encroached into an active timber sale area being harvested by Pyramid Mountain Lumber, Inc., Sceley Lake. Known as the South Lake timber sale, the area is an important source for Pyramid Mountain.

Jerry Parker, Pyramid forester, said Tuesday that logger Larry Copenhaver had evacuated men and equipment Monday, and that the fire is seriously affecting the mill's timber supply.

The sale is very important to Pyramid," he said. "It covers one and one-third years of allowable cut in the district, and represents over 9 million board feet."

Information is second hand, Parker added, but it appears the fire has burned through seven units of the sale. "One had been logged, but the others hadn't," he said.

#### Nature's way can Friends better than money. . . conflict with man

We haven't yet had time to check on the amount of money raised Sunday for the Blackburn Benefit day held in the Double Arrow meadow, but whatever the amount, it seems insignificant in comparison to the outpouring of community

We're guessing it was somewhat of a routine day for Jim and Lisa Blackburn as they probably made their way to the bedside of their six-month-old son, Andrew, to help him struggle through another day in his fight to overcome a severe

But a couple thousand miles away, a community of friends staged a fundraising benefit to help them cope with the tragedy they've been forced to accept. And we're sure that Jim and Lisa must have felt different on Sunday knowing their friends were trying to do something in their behalf.

We watched Sunday as hundreds of people gathered in the meadow to have a fun day and willingly lighten their pocketbooks in a worthwhile cause.

Many people donated their time, materials, and equipment for the Blackburn Benefit and it wouldn't be fair to start listing names because someone would in-

Many close friends of the Blackburns pooled their efforts and for several weeks worked together to organize the event and we feel they are to be commended. But all that work would have been meaningless without each and every individual who supported them in one fashion or another.

Coping with the ordeal they've been through and the uncertainty they still face has to be almost unbearable at times for the Blackburns, and friends are really more valuable than money at this time. And it's that kind of support that will help them in the days ahead.

### I must express my concern in the decision of allowing a fire caused by nature to burn in our wilderness un-

First, it's my belief that we as people have disturbed nature and can't be sure what is a natural situation. We have many things to consider such as the hundreds of north face timber slopes we have clear-cutted in past years before we learned proper timber harvesting practices. This has allowed much more wind passages in the western Montana areas such as the 70 to 80 mph wind storm we had in the Swan Lake area.

Also, we must deal with the fact that our planet is moving closer to the sun, which might have something to do with the thousands of new cases of skin cancer all across the United States.

Also, the two super powers, U.S.A. and U.S.S.R., continue to blast space craft, satellites, etc. through our o-zone while below we continue to destroy it with dioxides, nuclear explosion tests, harsh chemicals, fuels and smoke. Couldn't all these things have something to do with strange weather patterns that cause nature to start fires.

Let us enforce the people of Missoula and Secley Swan to clean up their wood burning practices, but allow 50,000 acres plus in the Scapegoat Wilderness to burn untouched because it's nature-caused. Let's allow 300 years of timber growth to burn into the ozone, but not allow enough timber harvest to last the loggers, sawmills, and their families 10 years of employment to harvest the timber. Let's allow 50,000 acres of gross burned clearcut to burn into the air in three to four weeks.

The elk that I interviewed in the area said they wouldn't mind two or three thousand acres destroyed so they had some forage and salt to lick through, but they really weren't looking forward to relocating to another wilderness because they were developing emphysema and they were scared to death of being trapped in the fire.

I'm sure that the tourists visiting our areas are enjoying the smoke-filled valleys of Montana and glad we are allowing thousands of acres of wilderness that 90% of the world will never see to

burn up because of nature. I hope someone gets the point.

## Superhosts?

I am sure that most of us agree that Secley Lake is as friendly as most towns. However, if we want to be recognized as being more friendly than other towns, we have to do some work on our "hospitality". In it's effort to create jobs and boost the economy through tourism, the State of Montana has offered to designate "more friendly" towns as Superhosts as a means of attracting visitors to the area.

All that is required to attain Superhost status is for a good share of local business people and their employees to

attend a two hour training program on hospitality. Such a program was offered on August 1st to 47 local business owners and their employees. Even though afternoon and evening sessions were scheduled to make it convenient, a total of only five (5) people attended. Such low participation will not carn Seeley Lake the Superhost designation

Do we need training in order to become better hosts? Recently a visitor asked an employee in a local business for information about interesting things to do in the area. The employee replied: "I don't know. I am working in Sceley Lake just long enough to make some money to get out of here". An isolated incident? During the recent Car Show and Swap Meet six vendors left early because of the way they were treated. One of the vendors took time to write a letter in which she said, quote: "I for one will let others vendors know the treatment they can expect in your area and I will recommend that they bypass your area for one with a little nicer atmosphere". The sponsors of the Swap Meet were all friendly people, but perhaps two hours of Superhost training would have enabled them to avoid this unfortunate outcome for their hard work in sponsoring this Swap meet.

I attended the Superhost training and received a wealth of information about the area as well as some common sense ideas about hospitality. Next time it is offered, I recommend it to the general public as well as business people. Let's make ours the friendliest community in Montana!







Fund-raiser nets \$17,000

A last minute surge of ticket sales helped the Swan Valley Volunteer Fire Department come close to their target of \$20,000.

The tickets were sold for the drawing on Labor Day in which the winning ticket had been purchased by Pyramid Mountain Lumber, Inc. of Seeley Lake.

# Swan District to evaluate Sunset Beaver Sale—again

by Suzanne Vernon

The Sunset Beaver Timber Sale located next to the Mission Mountains Wilderness near the Swan-Clearwater Divide, will once again be the subject of a Forest Service evaluation.

Several years ago the deficit sale was advertised but no bids were received because of the high cost of road construction for prospective contractors. Since that time, the Forest Service constructed 16 miles of roads under the Swan Lake District's capital improvement program. According to District Ranger Bill Pederson, the road construction did not differ from the original sale plans, except that the Forest Service paid for the initial roads investment rather than logging contractors paying for the construction.

Pederson sites two reasons why the sale area is being reanalyzed. One, because the original environmental analysis was done prior to the completion of the Forest Plan; and two, because issues and concerns of land management on public lands have been changing and Pederson believes the Forest Service should be responsive to those changes.

In conjunction with requirements of

the Flathead National Forest Plan several "area analyses" are being conducted in the Swan Valley. The area analyses for the Beaver Creek-Lindbergh Lake ecosystem has not yet begun and no such evaluation was conducted before the 1984 environmental assessment was completed for the Sunset Beaver sale. The Sunset Beaver Timber Sale,

although it was never sold, has already stirred considerable debate among environmentalists. One of the roads constructed in the area encroached on wilderness. The ensuing criticisms of Forest Service management drew national attention. Foresters at the Swan Lake District were blasted for being inconsiderate of wilderness values in the Mission Mountains. The Regional Forester later instructed Pederson and other top officials in Kalispell to resurvey wilderness boundary lines in critical

The resurveys have been completed in the Sunset Beaver area, Pederson said earlier this year.

Another change in the sale plan from the original analysis is that an entire section of land may be dropped from the original proposal. That section of

#### land, which borders private land near Lindbergh Lake, is being considered as part of a complicated Forest Service land exchange involving properties along the North Fork of the Flathead River owned by Mr. and Mrs. Art Ortenberg, Swan Valley. The Ortenbergs have tentatively agreed to transfer their North Fork property to the Forest Service in exchange for the section of land just south

of their Lindbergh Lake property. Local residents and concerned citizens who wish to comment on the new sale proposals should do so within the next month. Contact Bill Pederson, District Ranger, Swan Lake Ranger District, P.O. Box 370, Bigfork, Montana, 59911.




### Flathead Forest monitoring report
