

# Mild weather a bonus for the Elk Herd



I can't say whether you should still be gaining weight as an elk on the Game Range. Even though there's a lot of food available, its quality is a lot lower than when it's green. But, research from other areas would indicate that you're not losing weight either. Your fat stores are 100% intact, ready to be used if needed in a mid-winter

And, if you're an elk fetus, you are turning 3 months old and your development is progressing right on schedule for a birth on June 1. You should be as big and strong as a calf can be because your mom has had plenty of energy left over from her food to share with you. Again, thank the weatherman.

In fact, some of us here at Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks have speculated about whether we should declare that winter is over for elk in our part of the country. That's how big a biological advantage this mild early winter gives to our elk herds. No matter what Mother Nature throws at us from now until spring, elk will have benefited from the unexpected bonus of an exceptionally mild start to the winter.

Of course, what's good for is the pika. She likes 'em tall. At bring?



a full 7 inches in length, a shrew would easily fit in a pika's shadow.

Pikas are farmers. They cut hay in the summer and consume it in the winter, in the crevasses among the rocks in high-elevation boulder fields. Like shrews, pikas would benefit from an insulating layer of snow, and they probably have a little bit already at the elevations they occupy. But, a little more would probably do a pika

What if you depended on snow to make your camouflage work? Then you might be a snowshoe hare, and you would be bummed out right now. You're dressed for a party that Mother Nature postponed. So, your white costume sticks out like a sore thumb in a gray and brown environment. You're socially humiliated at least, a leasy pickings at worst for lynx and other predators. You're thinking snow.

Almost any weather you can think of is a mixed blessing in the world of wildlife. Right now, the scales are tipped heavily in favor of elk and deer. The advantage they reap now will help them endure the coming hard times when the tables are turned, weatherwise. Who knows what tomorrow will


