

Health Fair: Preventative Medicine Saves Lives

The Seeley Swan Medical Center's FREE Health Fair will be held at the Community Center in Seeley Lake on Saturday, March 22nd from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. There will be a wide variety of free medical information, including everything from free diabetes testing to free osteoporosis testina.

There will be several activities for children. including free fire safety training, 911 training and a story time with hot chocolate, so you can bring the children with you and still be able to have the freedom to pursue information for yourself while the children are occupied.

I would really encourage people to take advantage of the discounted lab work which can be obtained. Especially for people who have no insurance, these lab draws can offer a yearly opportunity for affordable testing. There are a number of different labs to be offered.

Cholesterol screening is now recommended to start at age 26. There are a small number of people who appear healthy and who suddenly have a fatal heart attack in their thirties. These people generally have an inherited cholesterol abnormality which can be picked up on this test.

If you are concerned about your liver, you. might want to get the Comprehensive Metabolic Panel. It screens for abnormalities which might be related to medications, herbal remedies or alcoholism, as well as for any abnormalities of the electrolytes which can cause fatigue and leg cramps.

The Cell Blood Count checks for abnormalities of your red and white blood cells which might be of concern if you have fatigue, memory problems or a change in bowel pattern. It can also de- CMP tect certain kinds of cancer.

The Ferritin is designed to screen for iron l inid overload and would be especially important for PSA people who have someone in the family who died Ferrit of cirrhosis or liver problems but didn't drink alco-TSH

Thyroid testing is good for people who have

struggled with weight gain, fatigue and/or depression their whole lives off and on, as well as those who have new onset of symptoms. Other symptoms of thyroid disease would include dry skin or hair, feeling swollen, being constipated or having vour hair fall out.

The official recommendation is for men over 50 to have their prostate level checked to help detect prostate cancer and enlarged prostates. These screenings are recommended because they have improved our ability to detect and treat prostate cancer in men.

Below are listed the health fair prices compared to the normal prices for these tests. If you would like to take advantage of these prices, you can call the Seeley Swan Medical Center at 677-2277 to set up a time to have the blood work up done that you desire. You must fast for 12 hours prior to the cholesterol check, but any of the others do not require fasting. Cash payment will be expected at the time of the blood draw, as this helps us reduce the prices. The results will be available to be picked up at the Health Fair on March 22nd.

This is a brand new event for the community and I believe it should become a yearly event. It is being sponsored by St. Patrick's Hospital, the Seeley Swan Medical Center, Western Montana Clinic and the Tamarack Management Company. It is through the support of these organizations that you will have the opportunity to gain valuable knowledge which will aid you in improving your own health. Let everyone you know who may be interested know about it and we hope to see you there. Keep stationed for more details next week.

Homeschooling updates By Mark Mizner-Welch

The first half of the legislative session provided much activity for Montana home school families. SB276, introduced by Senator Rvan of Great Falls, would have required annual testing of all home school students by local public school officials. There were several serious flaws with this bill, and due to the diligence of home school families throughout Montana, the Senate Education Committee voted to kill this bill in committee. Nearly 500 opponents from across Montana showed up at the capitol on a snowy Monday to testify against this proposed legislation. Much needed support was also received from the National Home School Legal Defense Association.

SB295, introduced by Senator Ed Butcher of Winifred, would allow home school families an alternative to the current monopoly held by public schools for driver's education training. Under the provisions of this bill, students applying for learner's permits would have a full twelve months of supervised driving experience, and would be required to drive a minimum of five hours per month with a supervising licensed driver. After avoiding what appeared to be certain defeat in committee, this bill was resurrected and given a "do pass" vote by the transportation committee. This bill has now been transferred to the House. where it will undergo further scrutiny in the second half of the legis-

O. My battery was dead the other morning, but when I went to my mechanic, he insisted on checking the alternator and the cables as well as the battery. Why?

A. Just because the battery didn't have enough juice to start your car didn't mean it was bad. All parts of the electrical system have to work together. Just like an apple, a cable might not be good even though it looks good. A bad cable or connection can prevent the starter from getting enough electricity to start. The alternator is the charging unit for the battery and maintains its electrical level. If it isn't charging correctly or the cables are bad, the battery can be without a charge, thus NO GO.

Elk on the Game Range — How Much Longer?

"Holy cow!" John Vore exclaimed.

I don't know about that, but I can confirm that hundreds of your elk were on the hillside just east of Clearwater Junction last week when Vore, Bob Henderson, John Firebaugh and I drove past on our way back from Lewistown.

Vore, FWP's wildlife biologist in Hamilton, should be used to seeing plenty of elk. His unbridled reaction just goes to show that it never gets boring, even to the folks who count elk for a living.

Eric Bergman and Justin Gude, graduate students at Montana State University, spoke in Lewistown last week about their experiences where wolves and elk already coexist. Eric studied wolf behavior in relation to elk that winter between Madison Junction and Old Faithful in Yellowstone National Park. Justin studied elk response to wolves in the upper Madison River Valley, south of Ennis

Things turn wild along blue ribbon waters when the Orvis crowd goes home.

What are the wolves looking for? Believe it or not, they don't seem to be looking for large groups of elk in central Yellowstone Park.

I guess we could have told them that.

Eric explained that his radioed wolves did most of their hunting in areas peripheral to the big elk groups. He speculated that this benefited the wolves by keeping large numbers of elk in the general area. If the wolves just piled into the big bunch, the elk would



probably scatter and disperse, making the hunting much harder.

Better to pick off the stragglers, and conserve the source.

Justin's observations of elk in the Madison Valley completed the picture. He found that as wolves moved through an area where elk were congregated, the elk broke into smaller groups. Once separated, elk fell into normal patterns.

Here's the picture of the Game Range that Eric and Justin painted in my mind's eye. Wolves watch the big group of 500 elk on the bunchgrass from a distance in January. As they prowl the forests on Boyd Mountain, they randomly encounter deer and small elk groups and prey upon them.

By the middle or end of January, continued wolf presence around the big elk group becomes a distraction. Maybe the wolves become bolder and make a rush. Or maybe it's just the daily scent of wolves coming first from one direction, then another. Whatever the case, the big group of elk gradually breaks up and heads for the timber.



According to Justin's experience, the elk would not necessarily leave the Game Range, but would just move into the timber like they usually do in mid-winter. Usually, we see elk disperse from the bunchgrass in February because the snow gets too deep, too crusted, or the best food is already consumed. When wolves are around, they just become one more factor that will eventually contribute to this annual break-up of the big elk group.

That means elk might be expected to continue weathering out February under the trees on Boyd Mountain, the ones you bought and traded for in Phases 1 and 2 of the 50th Anniversary Project. If our future experiences parallel those of Eric and Justin, wolves won't normally scatter our elk to the four winds in winter, as some of us might have imagined.

I'm sure we'll see for ourselves soon enough. But, information like this helps us manage for the kinds of habitats that elk will need for them to exercise their evolutionary instincts to the fullest.





When School Superintendent Dr. Jim Clark was still interviewing for the position of superintendent the school board asked him one final question, "What is nonnegotiable?" Speaking about the budget at Seeley-Swan High School on February 26, Dr. Clark related to the packed audience that his response was "reading and math with science coming." Motioning with his hands he formed a small circle. Inside the circle he said were those core subjects. Then he indicated a larger circle and said, "Everything else falls in the larger circle and that circle keep getting bigger." The difficulty he said with everything falling in the center core is that when budget cuts happen, everything gets smaller, not just the outside ring happen.
