atre is coming to Condon this week [Swan Valley Elementary School] puts it on, but Salmon Prairie is a small school, and there's usually no opportunity for bigger programs like this," he said.

FWP personnel come to preliminary agreement, then I'll need to forward the documents to FWP program administrators in Helena for review, comment, and eventual approval. over the past few months. Then I'll meet with folks at the Ranch. finalize a draft lease, and follow a similar approval procedure as outlined above

I owe a new management plan for the Clearwater Junction Conservation Easement, held by FWP. A new owner bought the 250-acre property on the northwest corner of the Junction last year. Although the conservation easement passes from owner to owner in perpetuity, the separate management agreement between FWP and the landowner is now out of date. Among other purposes, the new plan will aid the landowner in deciding on an appropriate approach for weed control. Time's awaistin' on this job.

Speaking of weeds, it's time to lay out this spring's weed control projects on our Game Ranges across Region 2. I have a general idea, but need to visit the sites and decide on boundaries that the helicopter pilot can recognize from the air. Herbicide will have to be ordered in advance of the first treatments that will occur in May.

This year, FWP is cooperating with the Powell County Weed District and the Blackfoot Challenge
