
of possible grizzly tracks along the Blackfoot River about two weeks ago. Fortunately, this report, if reliable, wasn't followed by a wake of bear activity near the bone yards and calving grounds of local ranch-

On April 2, we received a reliable first-hand report of grizzly tracks in the same area.

Which is the cart and which is the horse? Do bears come to the Blackfoot "early" because they remember the locations of humanproduced food sources, such as dead livestock, bird feeders, dog food and garbage? Or do bears that come out early turn to human foods when they find a scarcity of natural foods in late March and early April?

Our own Jamie Jonkel is qualified to make a good guess. Jamie says the big males that start rubbing the sand out of their eyes in March are capable of living off their fat in a sort of "walking hibernation" for quite a while after leaving their dens. It seems they really don't need to eat for a while. They may lounge around their dens for several days or weeks, sunbathing and letting the cobwebs clear.

Or, they may wander. Historically, some bears probably moved

to the Blackfoot Valley in early spring and fed upon the remains of winter-killed bison and elk. Maybe there is a so-called "genetic memory" that drives a few individual bears to the valley as early as March. Although they might not require food until the cow parsnip, dandelion, and glacier lilies sprout in early April, they make themselves available to take advantage of any carcasses they may find.

Nowadays the bison are gone, but there are plenty of road-killed deer and occasional natural winterkills that haven't already been cleaned up by coyotes, ravens, and eagles.

And, there are dead calves in if we want to avoid turning wild the cattle calving season, along bears into nuisances.

A number of years ago this town was honored with a visit by Adolph Coors III, once an heir to the Coors beer fortune. I say "once an heir," because as an adult who has accepted Christ, Adolph made a decision to relinquish all claims to his inheritance, since he felt it to be in conflict with the Christian values he had chosen to adopt. Not many, I'm afraid, would be willing to turn their backs on such a fortune. Adolph spoke to a crowd at the then Wapiti Resort. Few who were present were not greatly affected by his testimony. As a young man, he found himself fatherless when his father was brutally murdered. After that his mother turned to alcohol.

Few of us will ever have to experience that kind of trauma. Fewer still will eve have the occasion to turn our backs on so great a fortune. During his testimony, he pointed out that many of us turn to "things" to try to satisfy some inner void, which we mistake for a desire for happiness. He told of a tombstone he had seen in a cemetery that read: "She died in the pursuit of things." Next to her, the husband's grave read: "He died trying to get them for her." This would be funny if it did not tragically remind us of someone we all can probably think of.

Some years ago I had occasion to visit the Hearst Castle in California. Perched high on a hill, overlooking the ocean on thousands of acres of land, this monument to great wealth made a profound impression on me. There are three tours offered: one of the grounds, one of the first floor of the main mansion, and one of the second floor of the main mansion - each of these tours takes the better part of a day. During the tour a large concrete building adjacent to the main castle caught my attention. When I inquired of the guide, I was informed that this new wing was left uncompleted upon the death of Mr. William Randolph Hearst. At the time of his death, the guide informed us, Mr. Hearst had 15 warehouses in New York, each filled with art treasures from Europe, which he planned to incorporate into his Castle. These treasures included complete ceilings of old European cathedrals, windows, doors, tapestries, and art treasures of every imaginable kind. He employed a full time architect and an entire staff of buyers who combed the world for treasures. The thing that made the greatest impression on me was the fact that here was a





Osteoporosis, or porous . bones, is a disease that causes low bone density, leading to fragile, brittle bones that are more susceptible to fractures, particularly of the hip, spine and wrist. It can affect both men and women. Most of us know someone who has broken bones, shrunk in height, or lost teeth due to periodontal disease and bone loss. These are just some of the problems that can happen if your bones aren't as strong as they should be. The good news is that bone loss can be stabilized or reversed. That's why it's important to be screened: osteoporosis is preventable if bone loss is detected early.

Anyone can suffer from osteoporosis, but the following factors increase your risk:

any of the following risk factors: • A family history of osteoporosis • A diet low in calcium

and/or vitamin D Tobacco and/or alcohol



• A thin or small frame • Advanced age


