Morrison Deposits \$1 Million for CHIP

(HELENA) - State Auditor John Morrison asked today that \$1 million collected by the State Auditor's Office be used toward Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). "CHIP is good for the children, it's good for the Montana economy, and it helps control the cost of health insurance for all of us, it just makes sense," Morrison said.

The check comes to the state as part of the US Bancorp Piper Jaffray settlement. The \$1 million dollars, which is unanticipated monies, goes into the state's general fund. In a letter to Governor Martz, Morrison asked that the \$1 million collected by his agency for the general fund be invested in CHIP. "Investing the \$1 million of general funds in CHIP will bring \$4 million of federal matching funds already available to Montana, and will insure about 3,000 children," Morrison said. "Providing health coverage to Montana's children should be one of our top priorities."

Last month, Morrison asked the Martz Administration to allocate \$3 million in recently freed up Medicaid funds to the CHIP program. The Administration allocated \$609,000 in state funds to prevent program reductions and add all 1,334 wait-listed children to CHIP (effective November 1, 2003)."I applaud the Governor's efforts; adding 1.300 children is a step in the right direction, but there are still nearly 33,000 children who are uninsured in Montana.'

"Reducing the number of uninsured Montanans is one of the most important things we can do to improve Montana's economy," Morrison said. "Providing health insurance coverage for more Montanans will reduce the cost of insurance for those already insured. The uninsured often delay medical care until a condition is more serious, and more costly. That is bad public policy and bad economic policy. Providing more CHIP coverage would reduce our cost-shifting problem."

More than \$25 million in federal match dollars are still available to Montana for CHIP. If the state doesn't use that money it can be reallocated to other states when they deplete their own federal allocation. The state is currently covering 11,000 children under the ĈHIP program.

County school board applauds Gerri Delwo for service at SSHS

At the regular November Missoula County Public School Board meeting held Tuesday, November 11. at the Seeley-Swan High School, Garv Botcheck, Buildings, Grounds and Transportation Director led a round of applause for maintenance engineer. Gerri Dellwo for her service to the school.

He said. "The Seeley-Swan High School facility is one of the best in the district." He also thanked the staff for their part in making the school a quality facility.

Superintendent, Dr. Jim Clark, echoed these words in his report. He also said that all the high schools, except Seeley-Swan High, continued to see an enrollment drop. However, he stated, there has been a rise in elementary and Jr. high school enrollment, so Missoula high schools may see a turn around soon.

During the Curriculum update. Cheryl Wilson, reported that Seeley-Swan High School scored low on last year's presidential No Child Left Behind program.

But her message was "not to worry." She explained that test scores are based on percentages so that in a small school such as Seeley-Swan even two children being absent during the Measured Progress Test can drop the scores to a non-passing grade.

The school also scored low on graduation rate, but this was also a case of a small high school being hurt by percentages. For instance, if only six out of the average Seeley-Swan graduating class size of 30 left high school during the four years, the school will score low.

This was the case last year, but the percentages don't take into ac-



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count that some of these students made a life style choice that was right for them, some even choosing to speed up the graduation process by receiving a GED and going on to colleae

She also explained that the numbers don't take into account that sometimes when a child changes schools parents don't always request that the student's records be forwarded to the new school. In this case, "on paper" the student looks like a drop out.

Preliminary reports for the upcoming year show that the school is expected to score very high. Wilson expressed that small schools will experience fluctuations such as these.

Pat Swan-Smith, during the public comment session, read a written statement about the progress Project Success, a drug and alcohol program. was having at Seeley-Swan High School and asked the board to not cut the program.

Student Trustee, Jamie Adams, reported on school events including Red Ribbon Week, Girls Vollevball who placed fourth in District, Football, Basketball, and the Student Government Food Drive. She also expressed her sympathies to John Fisher's familv and said that 40 plus Seelev-Swan students and staff attended his memorial service.

Before the meeting the board met with staff. toured the school, and ate dinner with staff members and parents. A moment of silence to honor past teacher, and coach, John Fisher, who passed away in October after a long battle with cancer, was held at the beginning of the meeting.

The next regular Advisory Meeting will be held December 2 at Seeley-Swan High School at 7:00. Interested students, parents and community members are invited to attend.

Clearwater Resource Council okays Blackfoot Challenge plan

Twenty local residents met at the Clearwater Resource Council meeting held at the Senior Citizens' Center last Thursday evening to provide recommendations to the Blackfoot Challenge (BC) on future uses of Plum Creek Timber Company lands in the Horseshoe ity might be to swap some of the Hills area located south and east of the Double Arrow Ranch.

These lands are included in the recently announced plans for land acquisition and transfer by The Nature Conservancy and the BC. Hank Goetz of the BC indicated that there are 41,000 acres in the first phase of the purchase and approximately 47,000 acres in a second phase that should occur in about 2 years.

The Horseshoe Hills lands include some 9,000 acres that would be part of the second phase of the land acquisition. The BC is developing a plan for future ownership and use of all of the lands included in the acquisition, and is seeking input from the community of Seeley Lake specifically for this particular block of land. Goetz pointed out that the USFS has indicated an interest in acquiring and disposition plan for the Horseshoe maintaining these lands.

attendees identified the importance of Horseshoe Hills as an elk migration corridor. Some grizzly bear use, especially on the east side, was also reported. The area receives considerable recreational use, and supports a good trail network for snowmobiles, horseback riders, and hikers. Interest was stated in maintaining these values and uses. Public ownership of most or all of the area was thought to be appropriate, and the BC proposal of Federal ownership was generally supported. Concerns over needed future land management including road maintenance and weed control were noted.

of some attendees about the need for both an assisted living facility and affordable housing in Seeley Lake. It was not thought that the Horseshoe Hills land would be a suitable location for either of these. However, there may be a possibility of using other land, such as a section of State land near the town of Seeley Lake for these purposes.

Also discussed were concerns

If this were done, a possibil-Plum Creek Timber Company lands in Horseshoe Hills for the State owned section near town, transferring ownership to the State of some land in Horseshoe Hills and allowing affordable housing and/or assisted living to be developed on the existing state section. In this way, payment for purchase of the land for development in Seeley Lake could be used to offset costs of some Horseshoe Hills lands, with these lands going to DNRC for management. There were also some views expressed that with limited funds for purchase of Federal lands, that a small amount of the Horseshoe Hills. particularly near Route 83, might need to be sites for conservation buyers or development.

In conclusion, the attendees supported the Blackfoot Challenge Hills lands that includes maintain-The views expressed by the ing recreational use and access of the area, maintaining the area as a wildlife corridor, and converting all or much of the area to public ownership. The Clearwater Resources Council will continue to provide a forum for discussion of Plum Creek Timber Company land divestitures.


Location changed for book signing





Scoping Notice Request for Comment Seeley Lake Ranger District **Small Project**

The Seeley Lake Ranger District is proposing to salvage dead and dving timber under the recently authorized Categorical Exclusions authorities, and is requesting public input on this project. The project is being considered under Category 13 - Salvage of Dead and Dying Trees.

Boles Meadow Fire Salvage - This project is located in Sections 30 and 32, T16N, R17W, and in Section 8, T15N, R17W in the Boles Creek drainage.

The Boles Meadow Fire Salvage project would include what was previously identified as the Boles Meadow Right of Way (ROW) Salvage, because that project as originally scoped was not feasible to implement. The ROW salvage was originally proposed for eight miles of road, 100 feet on each side, for a total of 180 acres. Ground verification determined that the actual area affected would be less than 10 acres because the trees identified for harvest were scattered infrequently along the sides of the road and were not continuous as originally anticipated.

Therefore, the only salvage of the identified ROW project would occur-inside the proposed harvest units and along the haul routes used for this project. Roads to be used for hauling includes roads 16000, 4341, 16342 and 17640.

The proposed project would salvage dead and dying timber from seven (7) units, totaling approximately 240 acres. All harvest would be accomplished using ground based equipment. Access to all harvest units would be from existing roads; no road construction would occur.

A legal ad was published in the Missoulian on Tuesday 11/25/ 03. Site-specific comments on this proposed project are encouraged, and should be submitted by December 29th to ensure consideration




Kelly also stated that Gary has also been a force in the background for other vital educational projects for the Montana Loon Society.




